Alberta 2013 Fall Extravaganza

On September 7th, 2013; members of the Metal Detecting community from different areas of Alberta made their way to the tiny hamlet of Rochon Sands on Buffalo Lake for the second Annual EMDC/CMDC Fall Extravaganza Hunt.

Approximately 55 hunters took part in the hunt, and a few spouses and friends showed up to show support. Hunters arrived from all over the province, including Edson, Grande Prairie, Edmonton, Calgary, Sherwood Park, Bonnyville, St. Albert, Thorsby and Fort McMurray.

The fun began early on a rain-drenched Saturday morning, with members and volunteers getting together to seed the playing area with silver coins, prize tokens and silver jewellery donated by the clubs. The beach was liberally seeded with silver coins, Pre 1952 nickels, jewellery and a multitude of "hunt coins". Close to 1000 coins and prize-tokens were seeded in the beach for the hunters to find.

By 10:00 in the morning, eager Detectorists were arriving at the beach and looking forward to a day of fun and fine recoveries. Hunters were each provided with Minelab hats and totes (donated by GPS Central and Touchwood Detector Sales - local Alberta companies that are Minelab vendors). After a pre-hunt photo, the excitement was ready to start. At 10:30 the contest began, and for the next hour there was a frenzy of activity as each person looked for the seeded items. The weather was a bit damp, but it made for excellent conductivity.

After one hour, the seeded hunt concluded, and a BBQ hamburger lunch was provided - (out of the rain, in the Rochon Sands community hall). Thanks go out to Bonna-Jean Campbell (wife of CMDC president Andy Coward) for overseeing all the food for the weekend. She did an excellent job.

Event Sponsors donated Main Prize Draws, which included detectors donated by Minelab through GPS Central (XT 505), Garrett through Canadian Treasure Seekers (Ace250), and 2 pro-pointers - one donated by the EMDC and the other by Canadian Treasure Seekers (and Garrett) The Canadian Metal Detecting Forum Forum provided Gold and Diamond Testers to include in the draw. The Testers were won by an Edmonton Club member, who donated them to the EMDC for member use. Other items were donated by Golden Horseshoe Detector sales, and Neil of Touchwood Detector Sales (who attended the hunt, representing Minelab and Garrett). Drawn prizes also included a purchased Eurotech detector, Lesche and Minelab diggers, Minelab packs, provided by listed sponsors, and the Edmonton and Calgary Metal Detecting Clubs (EMDC & CMDC).





The 96 numbered tokens seeded on the beach were exchanged for great prizes - including beautiful handcrafted boxes, Calgary Stampede and detector related apparel, first aid kits, cinema tickets, silver and proof coins, water hunting gloves, treasure pouches and numerous detecting related hobby-items. Many of the token prizes were donated by CDMC and EMDC club members, and thanks go out to them. We also appreciate the numerous other items donated for token-prizes by the event sponsors mentioned in the previous paragraph.

There was a raffle of a 1935 silver dollar and a one ounce silver maple leaf - with profits (after coin purchase) donated to the community of Rochon Sands in appreciation for the use of the beach. After the lunch, drawn prizes, and token prize awarding - hunters exited the community hall into clearer and warmer weather and spent the rest of the day searching for treasures on the beach and in local parks. Unseeded area finds included George V coins, some jewellery, and toys. After a snack at 4pm, the event concluded.

White Gold and Diamond Wedding Ring lost for 10 months then recovered 10 inches deep.

This saga all started in January of 2013 when. Mrs. P. was feeding the horses and threw some hay over the fence into the horse paddock and off came her wedding ring. When she realized it was gone they did a visual search of the amongst the hay and snow but no luck. Dismayed she felt it was gone forever, 6 months later Mr. P. was searching the internet and found The Ring Finders and called me to come out. I went and searched the horse paddock to no avail, all I found were iron signals, after questioning them they told me they had scraped all the manure off the paddock in May to use in their vegetable garden on the other side of the 4 acre property. We headed over to the garden area only to find that with all the rain we had this spring it was too muddy to get into without sinking knee deep. Sadly, I was not able to retrieve the ring.

The last few days of September are waning, and I received a call from Mr. P. asking if I would come out again and search the garden as the harvest was done and wanted to Rototill the ground but thought we should give it another try first, I agreed.

To my surprise when I got there he advised me that his Dad had been over and tilled the garden not once but 3 times since he called me and his Dad had all so spread some of the garden soil on another part of the property. I figured that I was in for a long hunt. I set to checking where the soil had been spread before going over to the garden area. Nothing but nails there, so off to the gardens here I got lots of deep iron signals and after 1 1/2 hours, I had searched 3/4's of the garden and got a deep mixed signal bouncing from an ID of a scratch 45 to 80 on the garrett AT PRO, this was peeked my interest so I started digging at about 9 inches I hit non-tilled hard soil, I checked with my Garrett Pin-Pointer probe and the item was still deeper, after another inch the item revealed itself! Yes, it was the long lost ring in all its gleaming glory. Mr. And Mrs. P. were thrilled to get it back and we celebrated of a refreshing beer.







Online Research Tips

One of the tools that Metal Detecting hobbyists use for research is the computer. There are many resources available on the internet that can aid a Metal Detecting hobbyist in researching where to hunt. The internet can also be used to research and identify just what that "unusual" recovered item is. Some members who have been around for a while will recall that I often will share internet sites for I have found useful for research. Below I have listed some web-site addresses that I have used, and believe would be helpful to others in this great hobby.

The first web-site I would like to mention is http://canadianmetaldetecting.com. This is a metal detecting forum, but with a Canadian focus. It contains helpful information about everything from the best cleaning methods, iron electrolysis (to remove caked-on rust), to catalogues of buttons, coins, and military insignia. If you have found something you are not sure about, it also has a "what-is-it" section. If you upload a photo of that mysterious item, detecting hobbyists from all over the country are available with their years of "find knowledge" to offer information. The forum is home to many encouraging hobbyists, who freely provide tips and advice to new-comers to Metal Detecting.

One of my favourite sites for Alberta history and research is http://ourfutureourpast.ca. This is a site that has multiple uses, as it not only contains Aerial photographs, but hundreds of books about Alberta communities and history, and access to old newspapers, all in digitised form. The website was an Alberta Centennial project to digitize information and make it accessible to the public. The community books are searchable by word in chapter and in text. I have used both aerial photographs and community books to locate old parks, railway stations and church locations from early years of East Calgary history.

One of the best research web-sites available to discover information about a "recovered treasure" is the Canadian Archives site for old mail-order catalogues. This is a Government of Canada site, has a searchable archive, and can be located at http://www.collectionscanada.gc.ca/mailorder/index-e.html. In early Western Canada, it was difficult to obtain merchandise. Only urban areas had stores of any size, and smaller centers carried only the basics. In the Calgary area, these smaller communities would include towns like Bowness, Renfrew, Forest Lawn, Albert Park, and Midnapore. Mail order became big business in Western society. Many items purchased in early Alberta history came through the mail. Easton's and Sears catalogues were a common site in many Canadian homes, particularly around Christmas. This mail-order catalogue web-site lets you search by item, or by year, and shows digitized images of the catalogue pages. I was able to date a brass soap dish to the mid-1920s by its appearance in an Eaton's catalogue from that time.

Sometimes old photographs will aid a hobbyist to discover where to hunt, or where not to hunt. I have found a great resource for finding old photographs by using the Glenbow museum photograph archives. These can be searched at http://ww2.glenbow.org/search/archivesPhotosSearch.aspx. The photographs date back to earliest Calgary history, but the available photographs also show other areas around Alberta. This archive was used to research where buildings stood at the Keith tuberculosis hospital (now Baker Park), as well as what areas were in use as parks in Inglewood 50 years ago.
