History in the Palm of your Hand





The recent finds by CMDC member Al Cotterhill of a 1939 Royal Visit Token and a 1927 60th Jubilee of Confederation token bring us back to another time and place in history.

In May of 1939, King George VI and his wife Queen Elizabeth (later familiarly called "the Queen Mum") embarked on an unprecedented visit to North America. This was the first visit of a reigning monarch to Canada and to the United States, and helped solidify Canadian and American support for Britain. Even at that time the turmoil in Europe was bringing about fears of a second World War. The Royal Tour ended in June. By September, the world was at war.

To commemorate the visit, the Royal Canadian Mint struck three series of commemorative medallions. There were bronze and silver 38 mm medallions for sale to the public, and a 25 mm bronze medallion which was distributed to Canadian school children. The Obverse featuring the conjoined profiles of King George VI and his wife was designed by Percy Metcalf (that profile was also used on the 1937 British Coronation Medal). The reverse, designed by Emanuel Hahn, shows a map of Canada and the route followed by the royal couple during their visit.

The 1927 60th Jubilee of Confederation Medallion was presented by King George V to schoolchildren across Canada. The brass medallion obverse held the profiles of King George V and Queen Mary, with the reverse showing The Heraldic Shield of Canada. The Shield reflects the royal symbols of Great Britain and France, as well as a sprig of three Canadian maple leaves representative of Canadians of all origins. The Latin phrase "A Mari Vsqve Ad Mare" (translated "from Sea to Sea") is near the bottom of the coin.

These medallions were valuable to many school-children, and remain a tangible and important part of Canadian history.

Sunnyside House Hunts

As seen on the front cover of the Buzzer, CMDC member Jeff "Badger" Buchan recently recovered a 1797 Cartwheel Peenny in the back yard of a Centrury old home in Sunnyside. While CMDC members have found older coins in other areas of the world, this is the oldest known coin to be recovered in any area around Calgary, and was a surprise to everyone present.

The Cartwheel was 6 inches down beside a tree. The Cartwheel penny used a penny's worth of copper in the late 1700s, but was a short-lived coin, as minting stopped when the price of copper inflated. Because of its short mint-period, it is on the wish-list of many UK detectorists.

Thanks to Brett Buchan, who arranged with Bob Collier for this great opportunity. The Calgary Metal Detecting club is grateful to Mr. Collier, who allowed a few CMDC members to search seven century-old properties in Sunnyside. He was very impressed with the finds, and the care taken by Club members while searching his properties. Other finds included 1930s and 1950s "dog tax" tags, a rainslicker button dated prior to 1920, and many coins dating from the Depression through modern eras.







Winter CMDC Meetings

CMDC / EMDC Fall Extravaganza

On September 20, 2014 members of the Metal Detecting hobby from all over Alberta made their way to the tiny hamlet of Rochon Sands on Buffalo Lake for the EMDC/CMDC Fall Extravaganza Hunt. It was a gorgeous day for a hunt, with the sun shining and one of the nicest Fall days imaginable. Approximately 60 hunters took part in the hunt, and a few spouses and friends showed up to show support.

The fun began early on Saturday morning, with members and volunteers getting together to seed the playing area. The beach was seeded with silver coins, prize-tokens and a multitude of foreign coins (especially British two pence coins). Over 1000 coins and prize-tokens were placed in the sand of the beach for the hunters to recover. By 10:00 in the morning, eager Metal Detectorists were arriving at the beach and looking forward to a day of fun and fine recoveries.

Hunters were each provided with Minelab caps, totes, and other loot, provided by Minelab Canada, as well as a Minelab Xterra 305 as a prize. After a pre-hunt photo shoot (below) the day was about to begin. The beach hunt started at 11am, with the blare of an air-horn. Within minutes sand was flowing through the scoops & sifters, and Silver coins and prize tokens were being retrieved and socked away. Hunters were amazed by the sheer number of non-silver coinage popping out of the sand. At 11:45 the air-horn blared out again, and the morning competition came to a stop.



Then the hunters all moved to the Rochon Sands community hall for a delicious beef on a bun lunch. Dana Wiley and the Edmonton club put the lunch together, and they really outdid themselves! The meal was great! There was plenty of time to eat, and for hobbyists from all over the province to swap a few treasure stories, and to put a face and voice to friends met over Facebook. It was a great time.

The afternoon hunts were held from 1:30 until 2:30 pm. There was a second seeded Adult hunt, as well as a Junior (children's) hunt,. Both hunts were held at the same time, but on different areas of the beach. The adult hunt consisted of coins and tokens, with many of the seeded coins being pre-1936 silver. The children's hunt had silver coins, tokens and jewellery, as well as buried toys and bags of candy. Everyone had a blast.

After the hunts ended everyone proceeded back to the Community Hall for some more visiting, and more food for anyone who was hungry. When everyone arrived at the hall, the hunters got the chance to redeem their tokens for prizes. The numbered-tokens recovered during the event beach hunts were exchanged for a full-table of prizes.

There were over 100 token-prizes donated by multiple sponsors, including Minelab, Garrett, Radioworld Central, The Canadian Metal Detecting Forum and Northgate Stamp and Coin shop. There were also numerous other prizes donated by various club members. Two special token hunts were included in the afternoon hunt. One was a for a special "Treasure Chest" for Edmonton club members, and another a token for a special coin award for Calgary and other areas of the province. It was great to see that every hunter had a chance to go home with a great prize, and a wonderful day filled with memories and new friendships.













The 2014 Fall Extravaganza Metal Detecting event concluded with a beach full of people making sure that no coin was left unturned, and seeing what else had been left behind by years of activities on the beach. Although the area has been well hunted, a few Edwardian through George VI coins were still recovered from areas of the beech that had not been seeded.
